Timothy Dexter's rivals advise him to ship coal to Newcastle because England was famous for its endless supply of coal. They intended to humiliate him and expected him to lose everything, as shipping coal to a place already abundant in coal seemed like most foolish business decision possible.

production, creating a sudden shortage. This shortage of coal supply turns in favor of Dexter's and he made a massive profit.
