Introduction:-

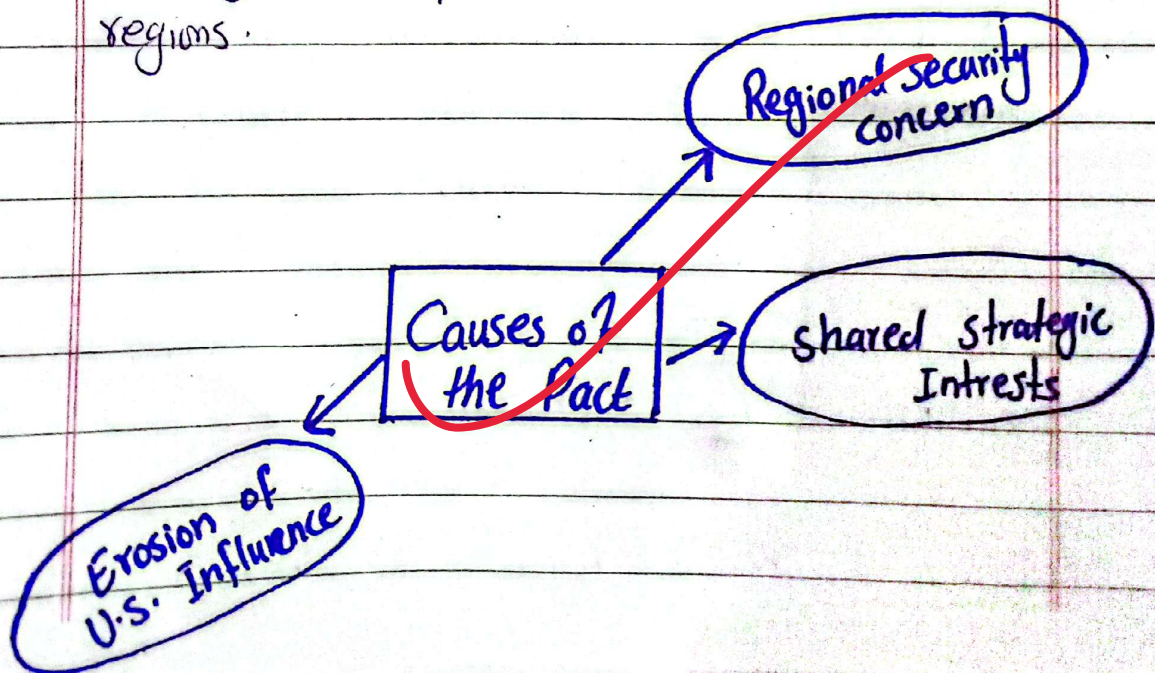

The pact stipulates that any act of aggression against one nation will be considered an act against both, committing each to respond with all defensive and military means deemed necessary. This development underscores the evolving geopolitical dynamics in the Middle East and South Asia.

Historical Background

The bilateral relationship between

Pakistan and Saudi Arabia has been characterized by deep-rooted ties, primarily driven by shared religious affiliations and strategic interests. Over the decades, the two nations have collaborated in various domains including defense, economic assistance, and diplomatic support. 2- Shared Strategic Interests

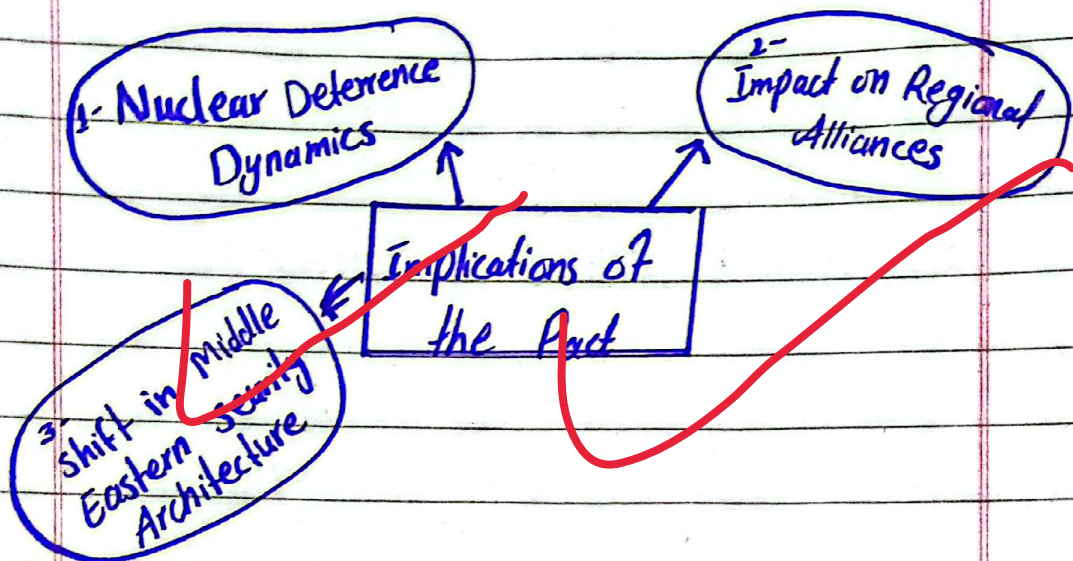

3- Erosion of U.S. Influence

Saudi Arabia's increasing skepticism about U.S. security commitments, coupled with the desire for a more diversified defense strategy,

prompted Riyadh to seek closer ties with Pakistan as a means to bolster its defence posture.

Implications of the Pact



1- Nuclear Deterrence Dynamics

While the pact does not explicitly include nuclear provisions, Pakistan's nuclear capabilities are ~~perceived~~ perceived as a significant deterrent. Saudi Arabia's alignment with Pakistan may be interpreted as extending Pakistan's nuclear umbrella over the kingdom, despite, official statement to the

2- Impact on Regional Alliances

The arrangement may strain Saudi Arabia's relations with India, given India's historical tensions with Pakistan. Any conflict involving with Pakistan could now be viewed as an indirect threat to Saudi Arabia, potentially complicating Riyadh's diplomatic relations in South Asia.

3- Shift in Middle Eastern Security Architecture

The SMDA signifies a shift towards a more multipolar security framework in the Middle East, with Pakistan emerging as a key security partner for Saudi Arabia. This development reflects a broader trend of Gulf states reevaluating their defence strategies and seeking alternative alliances beyond traditional Western partnership.

Critical Evaluation

The SMPA represents a strategic realignment in Middle Eastern geopolitics, driven by shared security concerns and a desire for diversified defense partnerships. However, the ambiguity surrounding the nuclear dimension of the agreement raises questions about its long-term implications for regional stability and non-proliferation norms. While the pact strengthens Saudi-Pakistani ties, it also introduced complexities into Saudi Arabia's broader foreign policy, particularly concerning its relations with India and the West.
