A) Integration of Women in Development

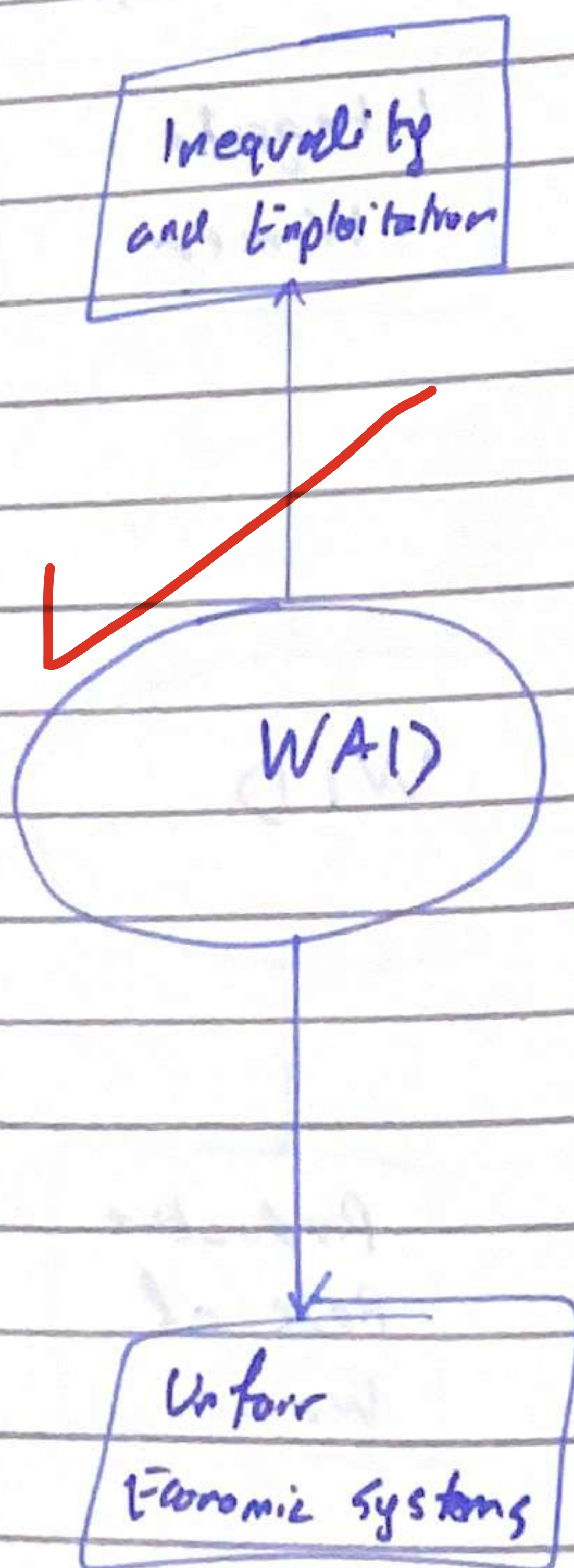
WID approach is of the view that women have no part in development in current systems. Either it is social or economic systems, major implementation persons are accepted by men.

2) Women and Development (WAD)



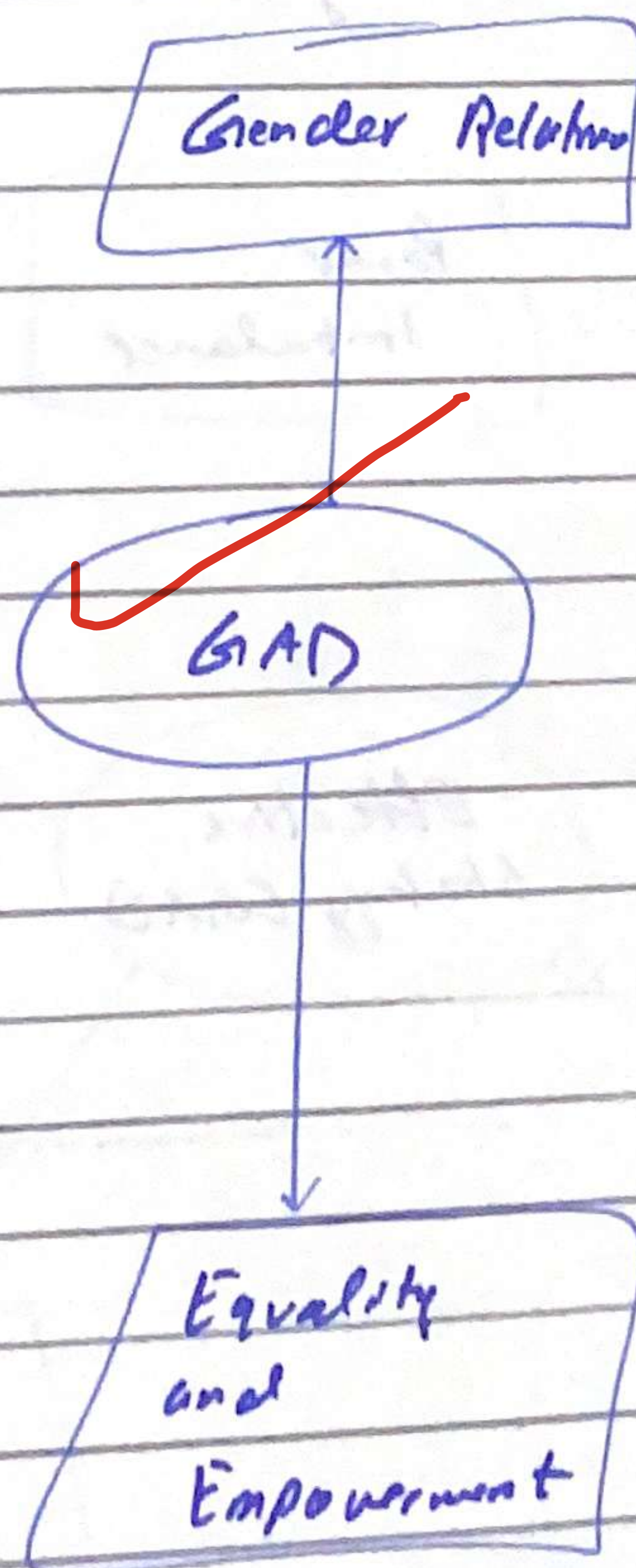
A) Women are Already Part of Development

3) Gender and Development (GAD)



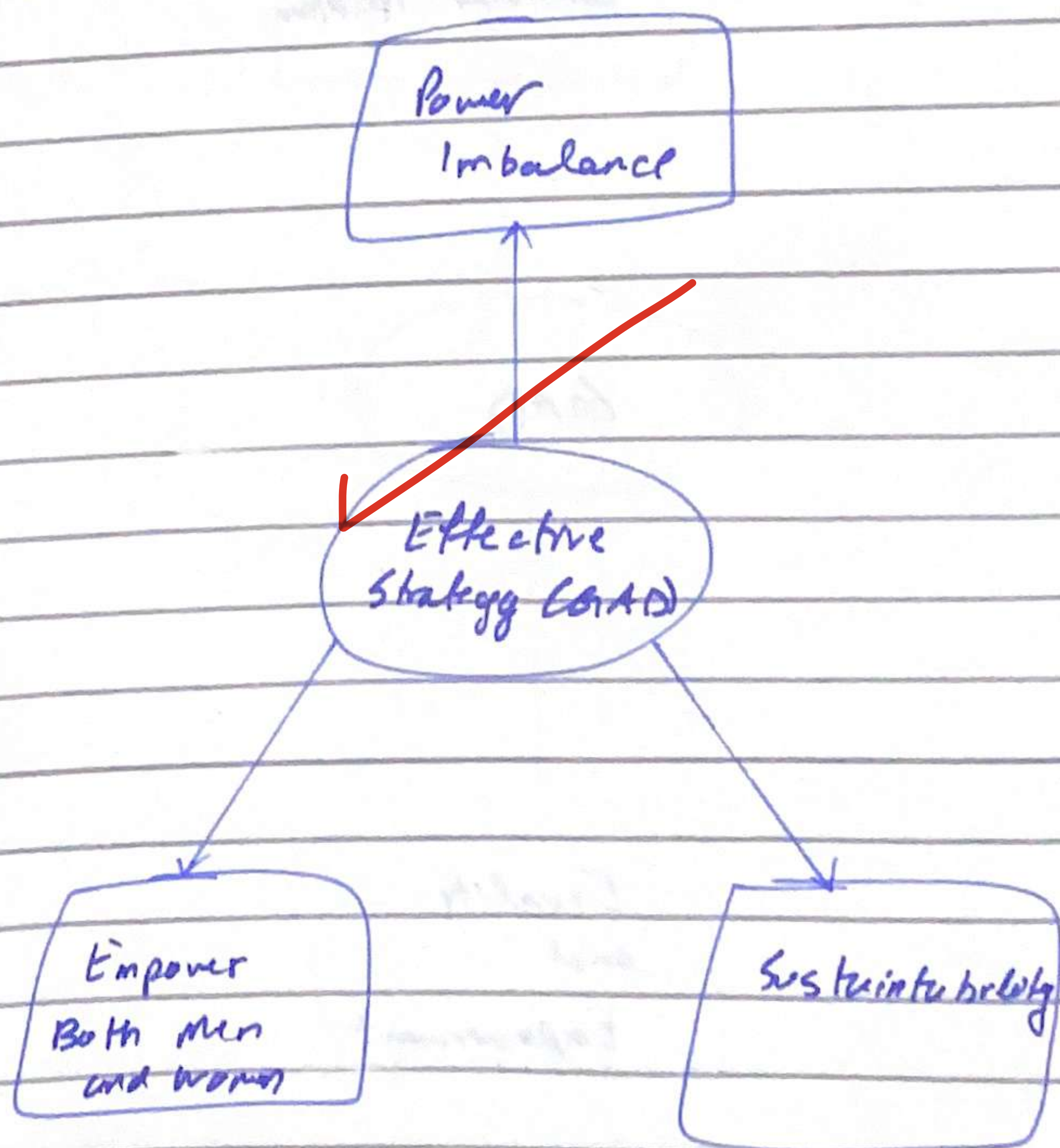
A) Focus on Gender Relations, not just women

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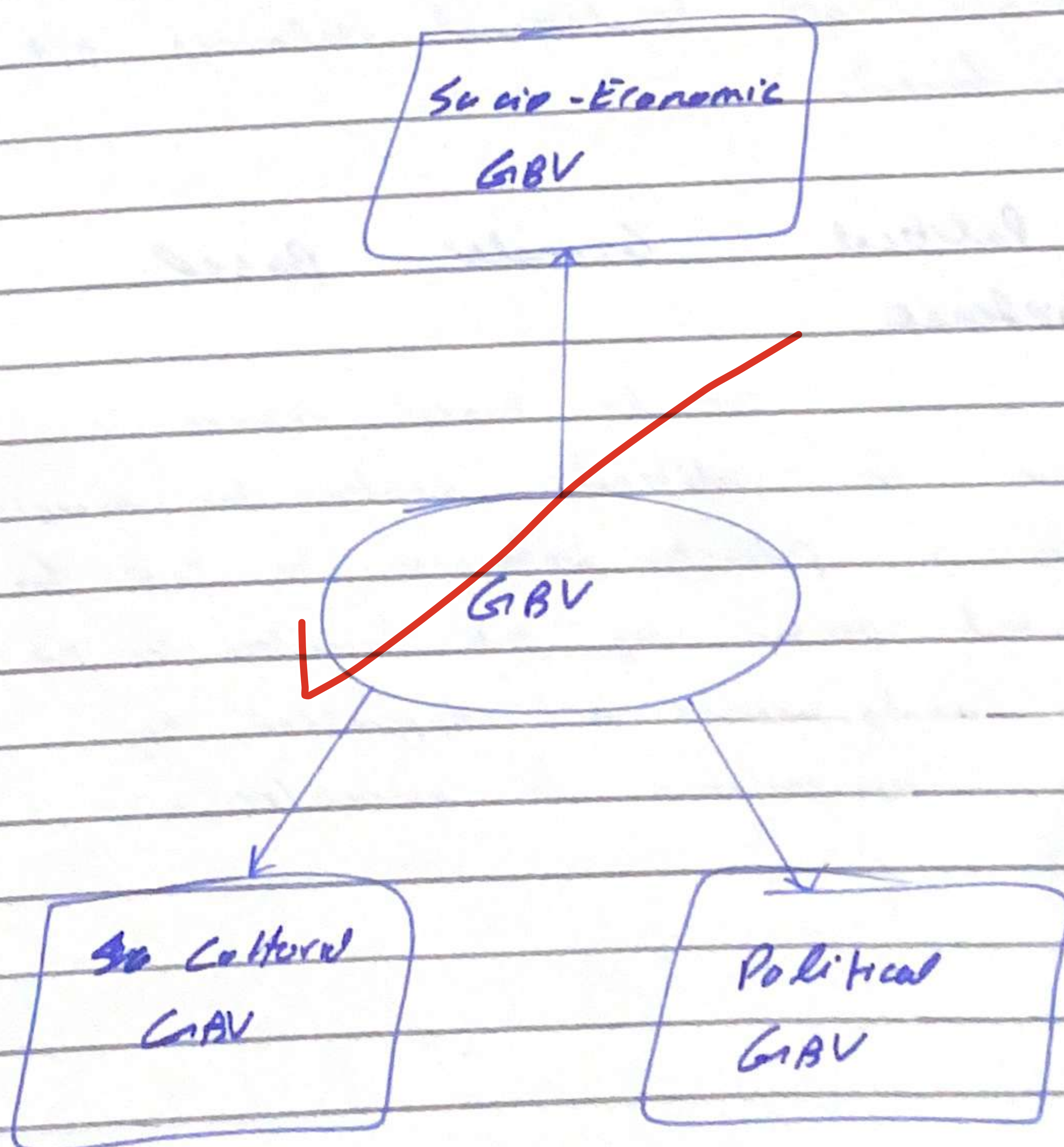
Question 2

B) Cultural Gender Based Violence

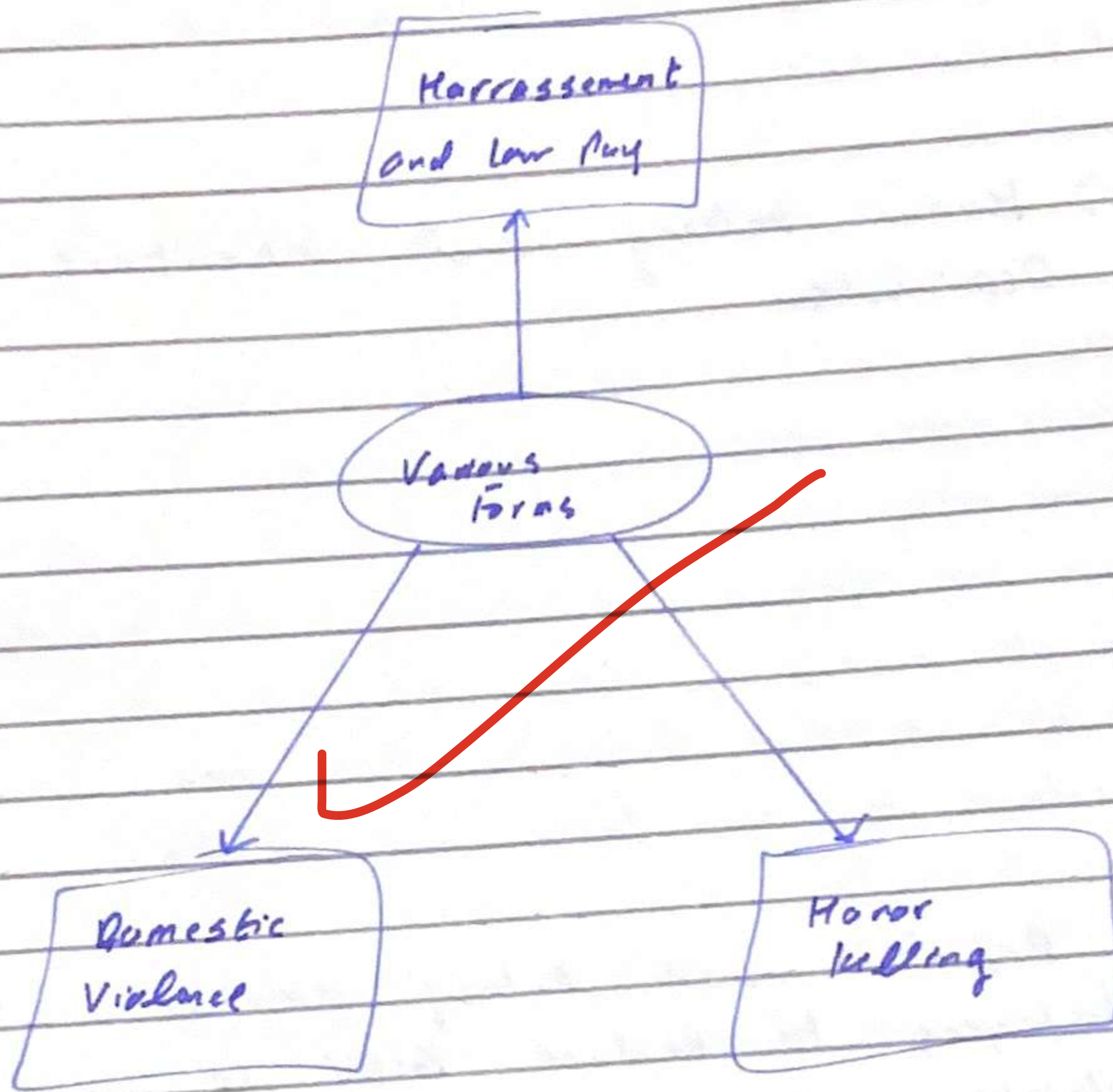

B) Domestic Based Violence on Women

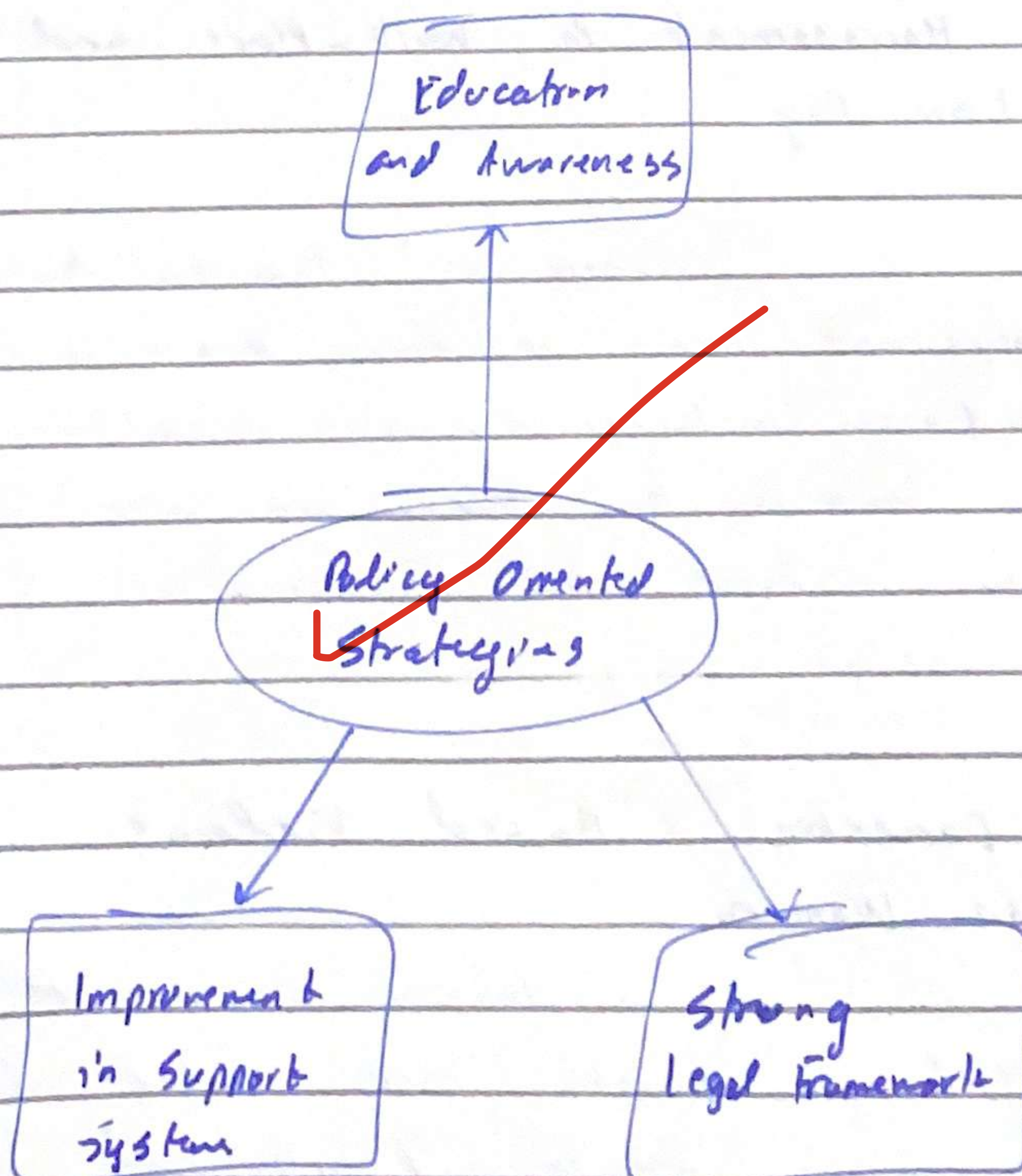
In Pakistan Women are faced being domestic based violence due to economic dependency. Victims of

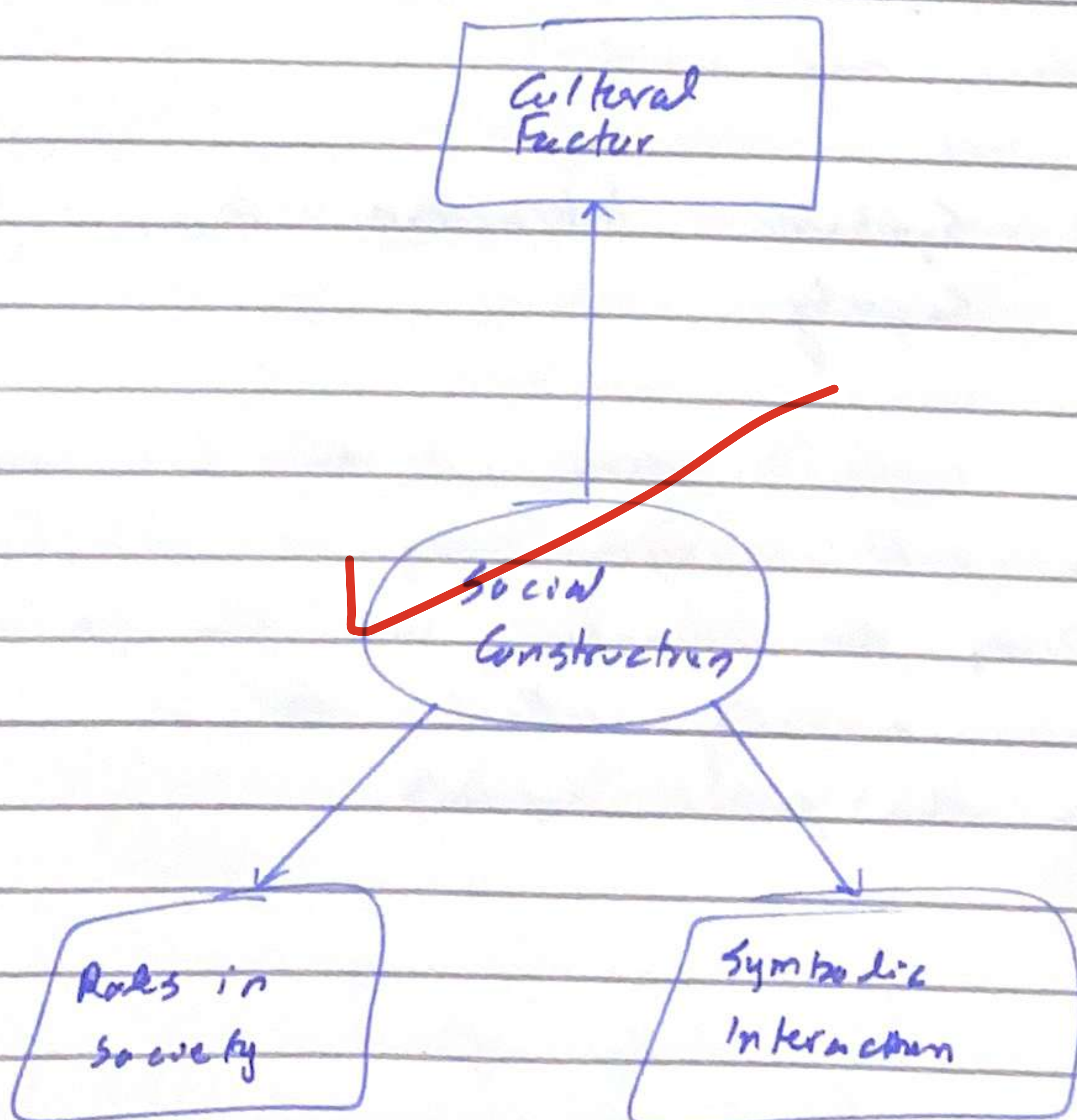
Question 5

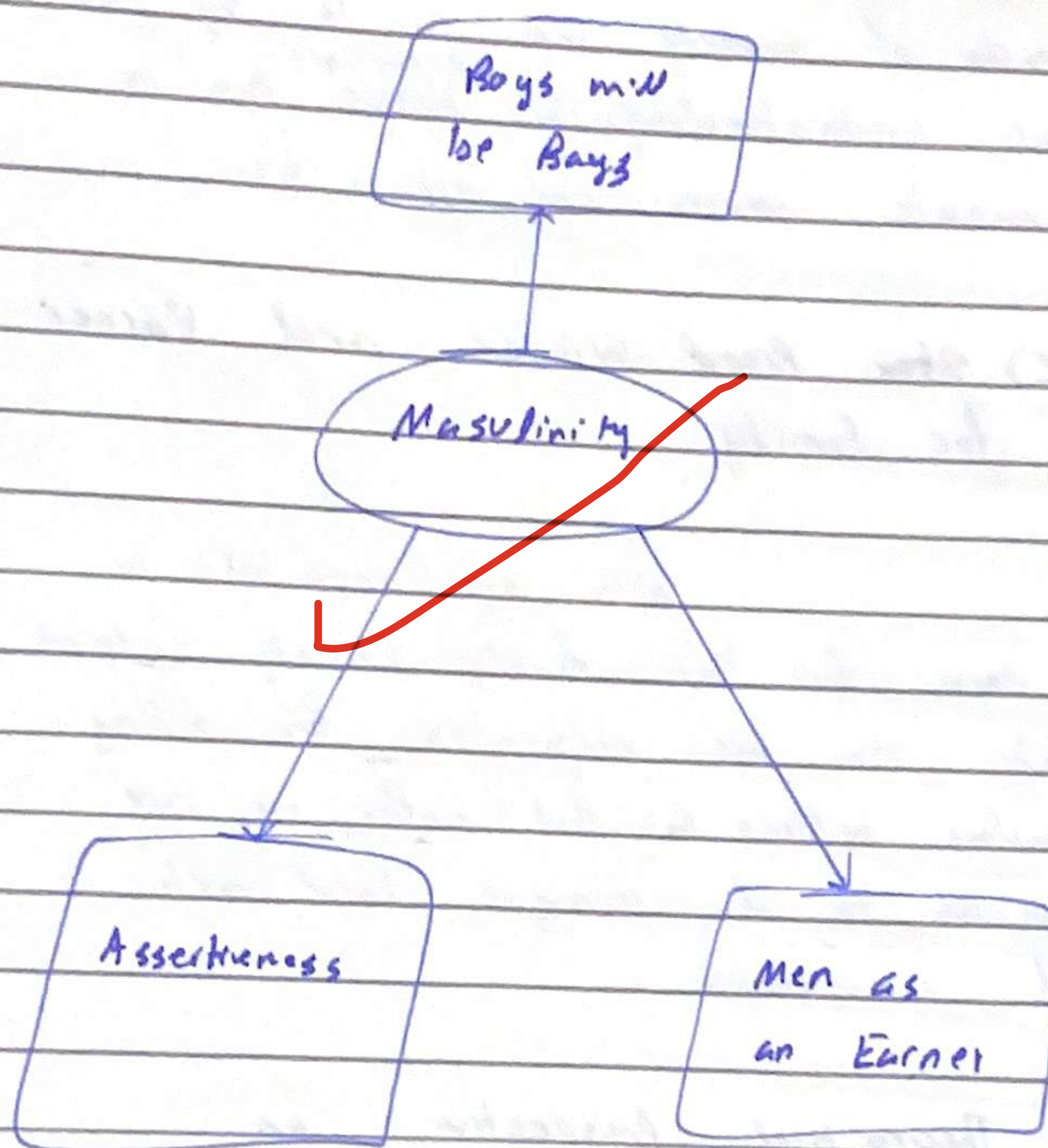
B) Distinct Roles of Men and Women in Society

B) Expectation of Assertiveness in a Society

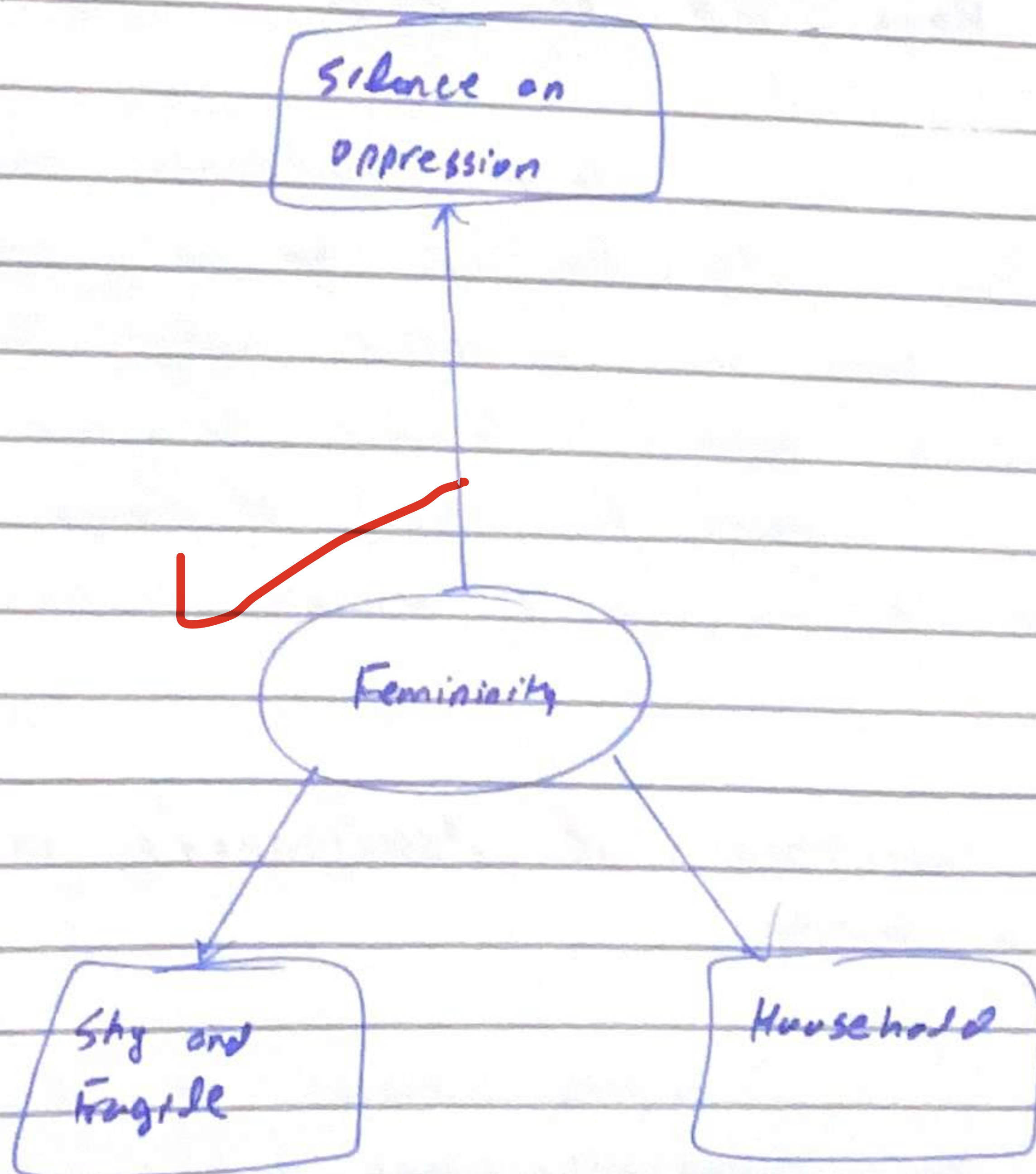
Society expect men to be brave, courageous, strong and pain bearing.

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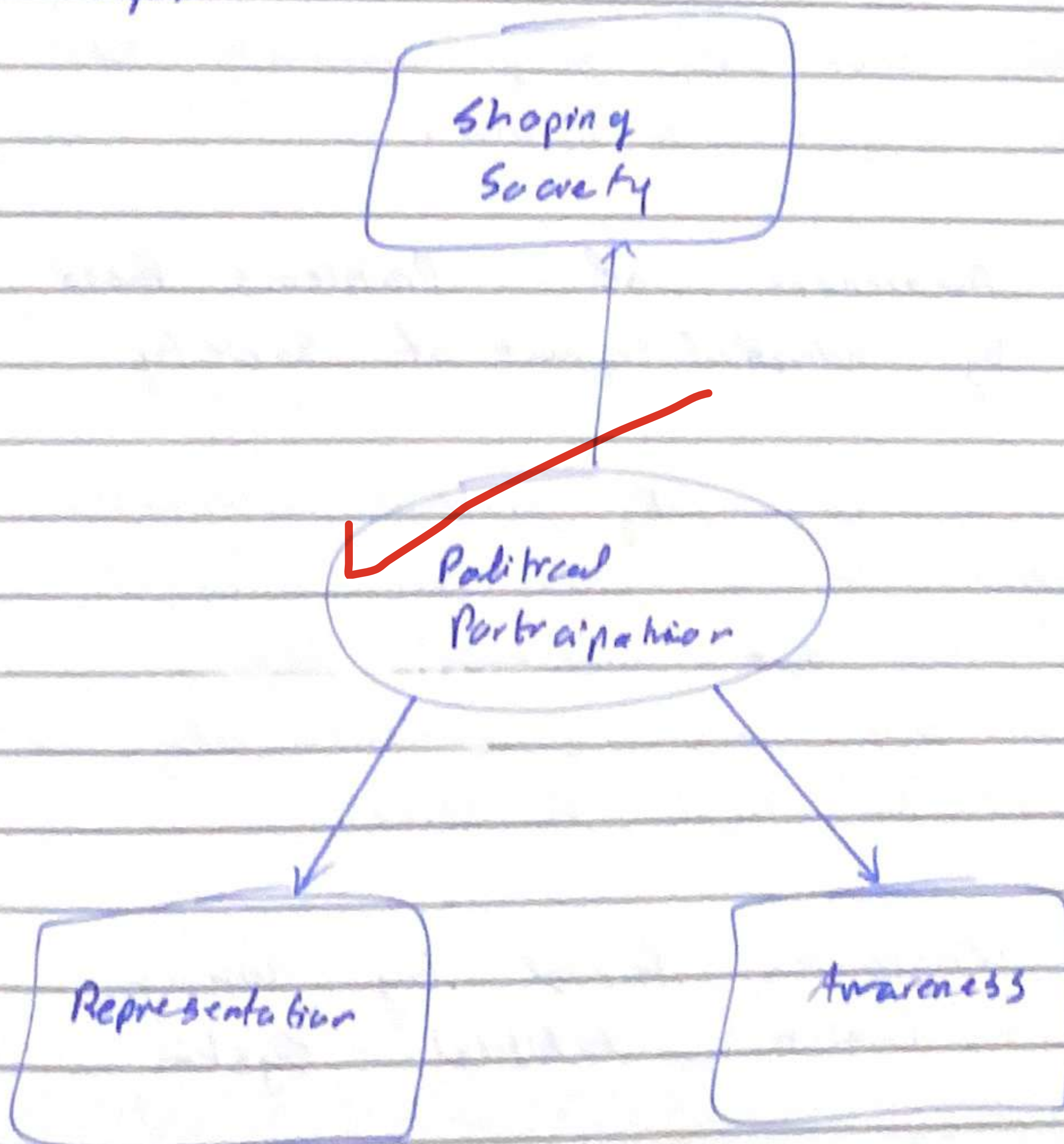
Question 6

B) Representation in Policy Framework

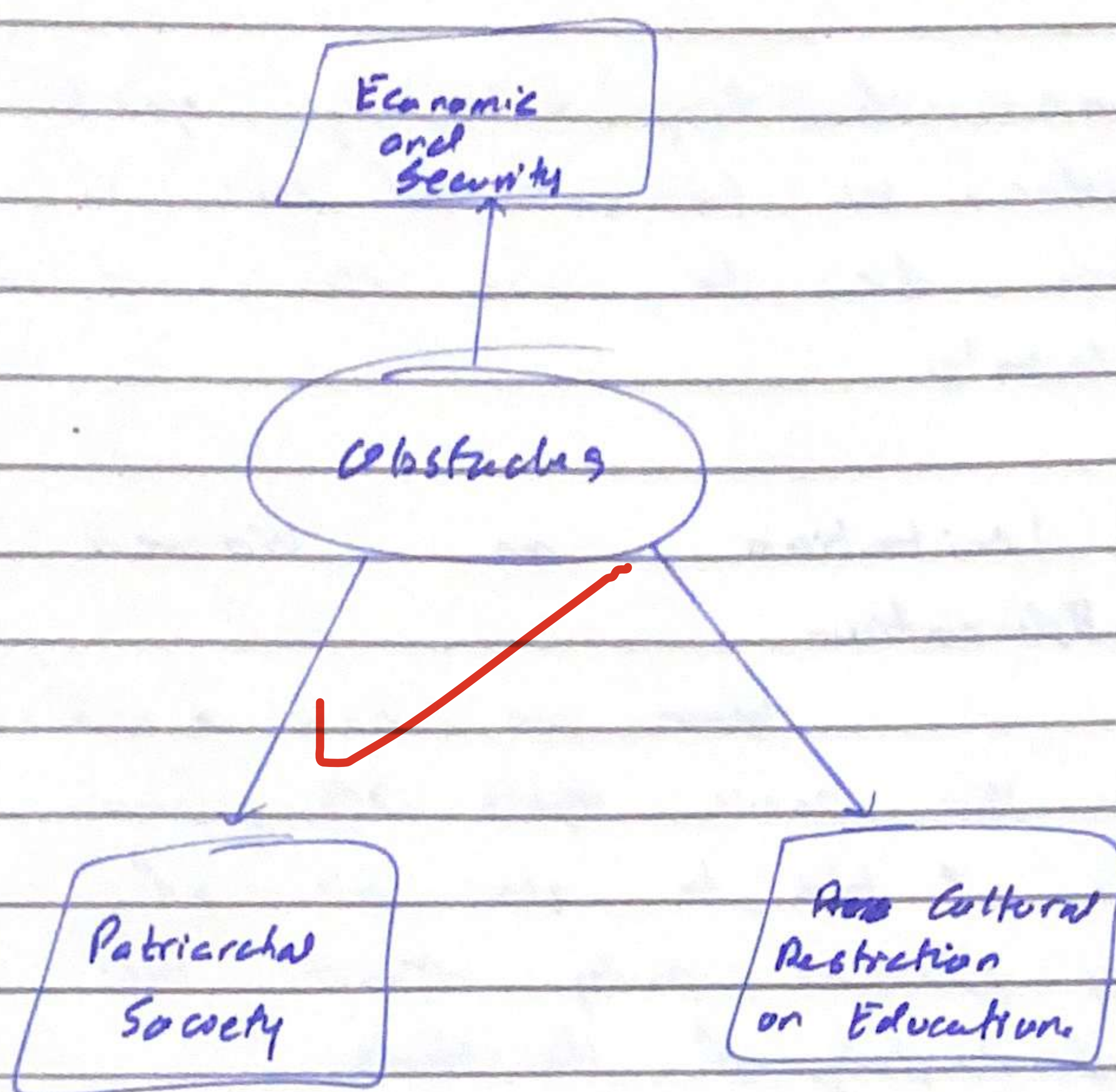

B) Less Turn-out of Votes due to Patriarchal Mindset

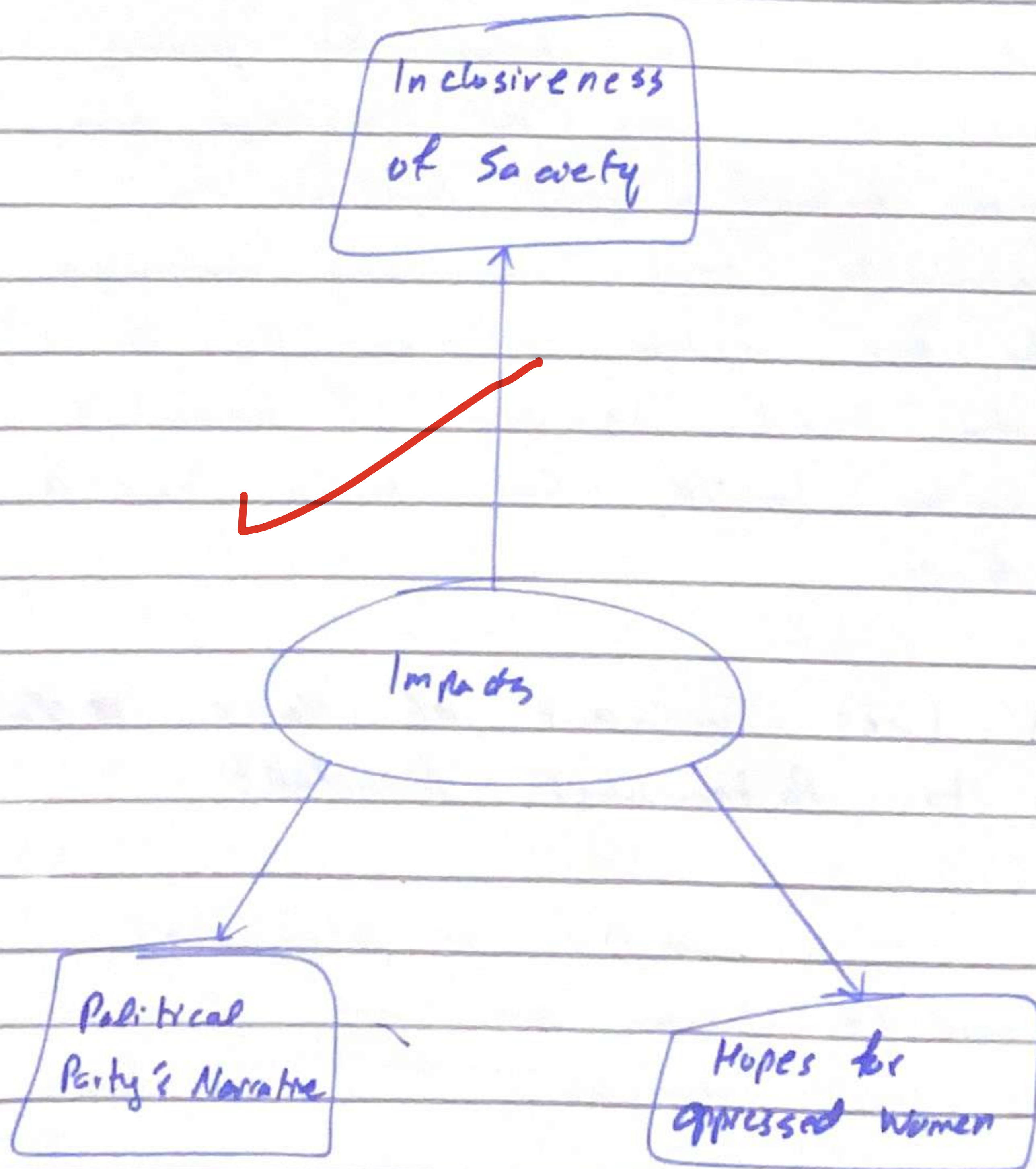
Due to patriarchal mindsets women are not encouraged to get representation in elections.
